Forewords of the Chairman of the Board of Directors

Dear All,

This year we are celebrating the 10th anniversary of the Foundation for Holocaust Victims (FHV). By means of the Annual Report, we would like to inform you of the fundamental activities of the FHV in the past year. Moreover, on the occasion of the anniversary, it has become a custom to look back over the whole period of the FHV existence, and to perorate and to praise.

I will try to remain a bit more modest – I could say that the FHV performed a standard work last year, i.e. a good work and fulfilled its basic tasks defined in the Care, Remembrance, Future and Renovation programmes. As opposed to previous years, the FHV has allocated certain financial means to the activities targeted against the growing neo-Nazism. The need for prevention is an urgent matter, as well as the education of the youth.

In 2009, the Board of Directors of the FHV and the Board of Directors of The Foundation of the Czech Council for Nazi Victims (CCNV) came to an agreement to merge the foundations, due to the fact that the FCCNV had already fulfilled all of its tasks. The FHV, as the nearest partner of theirs, was able to takeover the remaining agenda. This demanding administrative task required a considerable amount of effort. Nevertheless, we managed to steer through all difficulties and guide the merger to a successful conclusion.

I would like to share a personal experience with you. On 28th October, I attended a ceremonial unveiling of two Holocaust victim memorials in two towns of the Kutna Hora region. The towns are of a rather small importance and so the immense effort of the mayors and citizens of these towns to commemorate their fellow citizens in the most honourable places of their towns left a deeper impression on me. The contribution of the FHV to the memorials made me feel proud, since the memorials also carry the message to our descendants, reminding them of the events that happened in their towns.

Allow me to express my personal opinion concerning the publicity of such important activities, as are the main tasks of the FHV. Nowadays, in the times of media, it seems that those who are not mentioned in the newspaper every day, those who are not part of the daily TV broadcast or who are not a topic for media events, almost do not seem to exist. Personally, I do not want to resign myself to this superficial way of seeing current life. It is obvious that the work for the survivors, the support of cultural, social and educational activities, as well as the restoration of monuments, cannot receive great media attention. The smaller the publicity, the bigger is the impact of these particular events to the life and behaviour of the people concerned. Nowadays, easy and clear solutions are preferred, including the media events, so the activities performed by the FHV then logically become less favoured. I am grateful to the fact that the FHV activities are not splashed on the front pages of the newspapers. For me personally, this has become a sign that the activities we have been performing voluntarily for the last ten years are right and performed in the proper manner.

I would like to thank all the people who have been collaborating with the FHV and wish them all the best for the coming years.

Mission Statement and Activities

We Mitigate the Injustices of the Past and Support the Future

The Foundation for Holocaust Victims was established on 31st July 2000 by the Federation of Jewish Communities in the Czech Republic on the basis of the recommendations of the Joint Working Committee Focusing on Mitigating Some Property Injustices to Holocaust Victims. The Joint Working Committee was established on the basis of the resolutions of the Washington Conference on the Property of Holocaust Victims (1998) by Dr. Pavel Rychetsky, the Deputy Prime Minister at that time. The Committee under the leadership of Dr. Pavel Rychetsky focused on the studies of the history of the Nazi persecutions of Jews, and specifically the racial persecution of immovable property within the territory of the Czech Republic. The Committee presented proposals to the government which would enable the mitigation of some property injustices to Holocaust victims or their descendants. The Committee also initiated the approval of Law No. 212/2000 Coll. The Czech Parliament approved this Law On Mitigating Some Property Injustices Caused by the Holocaust on 20th June 2000. Based on this resolution, the Chamber of Deputies and the Czech Parliament made a decision, on 15th September 2000, to transfer funds amounting to CZK 300 million over to the Foundation for the Holocaust Victims account.

In the period of 2001 to 2005, we administered the Compensation Programme. With a total amount of CZK 100 million, we compensated people who, as a result of racial persecution during the occupation of today's Czech Republic by Nazi Germany, had been deprived of their immovable property, and whose property was not returned to them according to valid restitution regulations, foreign claims settlements, or other forms of compensation.

We further support those social, psychological and health care projects focusing on the Holocaust survivors, educational projects on the Holocaust, development of the Jewish communities, education in Judaism and the reconstruction of Jewish monuments. We yearly allocate CZK 15 million.

The remaining Holocaust victims are slowly departing our world. They are leaving a world where, 65 years after the end of WWII, there still exist people who deny the Holocaust, where Nazi movements are becoming stronger, where anti-Semitism is being spread around the public, as well as xenophobia and racism. The FHV, therefore, actively contributes to the remembrance of the Holocaust victims. We take part in the organization of commemorative meetings and events. We co-organize ceremonial commemorative meeting of the Shoa survivors and representatives of the Government on the grounds of the Czech Senate on the occasion of the International Holocaust Remembrance Day and the Day for the Prevention of Crimes against Humanity. We also co-organize the reading of the names of the Holocaust victims in public, which is annually held on Namesti Miru Square in Prague on the occasion of Jom ha-Shoa.

In association with the Federation of Jewish Communities in the Czech Republic, we co-organize lectures and seminars for the employees of Jewish communities and partnership organizations. The attendance on the first seminar on Jewish monuments and burial rituals was 80 participants. The seminars also enable the participants to personally meet people working in the same field, to exchange experiences and opinions.

We search for other sources of finances. Every year we organize a benefit concert, the proceeds of which serve to support the projects within our programmes of Care, Remembrance, Renovation and Future.

We quarterly publish an InfoBulletin, where we refer to FHV supported projects and other activities of the FHV. We also publish the memories of the survivors and up-to-date information on our activities. The Info Bulletin is registered by the Ministry of Culture of the Czech Republic and is mainly distributed in an electronic format. The bulletin can be downloaded from our website: www.fondholocaust.cz.

Principal Events in 2009

27 January 2009

Ceremonial Commemorative Event in the Czech Senate

Employees and volunteers of the FHV assisted the Federation of Jewish Communities of the Czech Republic with the organization of the ceremonial event on the occasion of the International Holocaust Remembrance Day and the Day for the Prevention of Crimes Against Humanity, which is traditionally held on the premises of the Senate of the Parliament of the Czech Republic under the patronage of its president, Dr. Premysl Sobotka. The event is visited by Shoa survivors, representatives of the government, ambassadors and representatives of the Jewish and Roma organizations.

21 April 2009

Yom ha-Shoa

In association with The Institute of Terezin Initiative, we organized, for the fourth time, a pious event in public to commemorate the Holocaust victims. We remember the Holocaust victims by reading out their names. The names are read by the public participating in the event on Namesti Miru Square in Prague. The event is held under the patronage of the Mayor of the City of Prague, Dr. Pavel Bem. Partners of the project are the Czech Union of Jewish Youth, the Jewish Museum in Prague and the Lauder Schools run by the Prague Jewish Community.

We thanked, in public, everyone who had provided us with photos and materials from their private collections to the Database of the Victims, which is an on-line source of information and authentic materials on Czech and European Holocaust victims www.holocaust.cz/cz2/victims/victims. The Institute of Terezin Initiative introduced information material, a part of which were the materials provided, and can be found by clicking on www.holocaust.cz.

Under the leadership of Gafna Vanova, Lauder School students in association with the Institute worked on the project called "Law in the Times of Injustice",



and the outcome of the project was presented to the public by the students on the occasion of this event.

The public remembrance was visited by several hundreds of people. The reading was performed by Shoa survivors, representatives of public and cultural lives, and traditionally we had Tana Fischerova, Marta Kubisova, Milan Hein and Senator Tomas Topfer come to support us, as well as the Mayor of Prague 2, Ms. Jana Cernochova, representatives of the Roma and Jewish Communities, students, but also passers-by. Media partnership was established with the "Hospodarske noviny" paper and Radio 1.

28 –30 June

Holocaust Era Assets Conference

We actively participated on the International Conference on the Holocaust Era Assets, organized by the Government of the Czech Republic on the occasion of the Czech EU Presidency. The director of the FHV had a speech on the Social State of Affairs of the Holocaust Victims in the Czech Republic and on the Compensation Programme.

1 July 2009

Calls for Proposals within the CARE, REMEMBRANCE, FUTURE and RENOVATION Programmes

We announced the 9th call for proposals in order to support the projects within all our programmes. The deadline for proposals was stated for 23 September 2009.

18 August 2009

Merger Project with the Czech Council for Nazi Victims and the FHV

The Boards of Directors of the Czech Council for Nazi Victims (CCNV) and the FHV signed a project for the merger of the foundations as of 1 September 2009. The CCNV terminated all its activities and we took over its agenda, especially the supervision of the supported projects.

2 September 2009

Seminar for Applicants

We organized a seminar for the FHV grant applicants. The seminar focused on the grant rules and conditions of the 9th Call for Proposals.

2 September 2009

Educational Seminar

The first seminar on the Jewish Monuments and Burial Rituals was visited by tens of employees

of the Jewish Communities and partnership organizations. The lecturer on the Czech and Moravian monuments was architect Jaroslav Klenovsky, on the symbols of tombstones, historian Iva Steinova, on burial rituals, Chaim Koci, and on the cemeteries as a valued historical source, Daniel Polakovic.

19 November 2009

Allocation of Grants for 2010

The FHV Board of Directors allocated grants for the projects implemented in 2010. There were 77 supported projects to a total sum of CZK 15 million.

26 November 2009

Benefit Concert

We had the Roma music group Terne Chave and Trombenik Klezmer Band performing at our benefit concert. The event was traditionally held in Baracnicka Rychta, this time in association with the Association for Ustek Synagogue and Cemetery. The collected amount of CZK 41,444 will be used to support the 2010 projects. The donors contributed to the raffle, and an MP, Robin Bohnisch, invited the guests for a glass of Israeli wine. We would like to thank everyone for coming and we look forward to November 2010!

Grant Programmes



CARE | REMEMBRANCE | RENOVATION | FUTURE

We have already been supporting the programmes Care, Remembrance, Renovation and Future for eight years. Since 2006, we have been allocating CZK 15 million yearly.

In 2009, we also supported those projects focusing on the prevention of anti-Semitism and vandalism, with CZK 500 thousand. Within the Care programme, we allocated CZK 6 million, within the Renovation, CZK 7.5 million, and within the Remembrance and the Future, a CZK 1.5 million in total.

Rules for Endowment Benefits Distribution

In terms of the distribution of endowment benefits, the Foundation for Holocaust Victims prioritizes organizations associated within the Federation of Jewish Communities in the Czech Republic, followed by civic societies, public beneficial organizations, institutions established by church, public service institutions, and allowance organizations registered within the Czech Republic.



The call for proposals is announced once a year, usually in July, and the deadline for projects is September. We support the projects for the following calendar year. The projects shall be carried out within the territory of the Czech Republic.

Our priority is to support projects with multiple sources of financing and a minimal share of their own or other resources to the amount of 10%, in the case of allowance organizations the minimum share is 50%, and in the case of legal entities for the purpose of business, the minimum share is 80%.

Within the Care and Renovation Programmes, the maximum amount to apply for is not stated. The maximum amount of endowment benefit for the projects within the Future and Remembrance Programmes is CZK 50,000, excluding the anti-Semitism and vandalism projects. The applications shall be supplied on relevant forms, which are available on the FHV website.

The applications will be evaluated by the respective grant committee nominated by the FHV Board of Directors, and foundation benefits will be granted on the basis of the FHV Board of Directors recommendation.

To obtain the foundation benefit there is no legal claim. The results of the public tender will be published on the FHV website and all applicants will be informed in writing. Successful applicants will be awarded the endowment benefit and will sign a contract with the FHV. The contract enables the verification of the use of the foundation benefit, and also, in certain cases (violation of contractual conditions), its return.

The supported organizations shall present the FHV with continuous and final reports on the projects, as well as the reports on the budget. The FHV actively participates in the supported projects and informs about the projects through its infoBulletin.

Care Programme

The Care Programme is a priority FHV programme focusing on the support of psychological, social and health care projects for Holocaust survivors, and partly also for their second and third generation descendants.

We support residential care, home care, psychological assistance for people suffering from post-traumatic syndrome, the operation of the day-care centres run by the Jewish communities, social fieldwork, social advisory services, personal assistance, ergo therapy, physiotherapy, rehabilitation, medical care, staff on call to the clients, and activity programmes (e.g. Inter-generation contacts, exercising, cultural events, activities for groups). We strive to provide quality social and health care for the Shoa survivors and their families, as well as supporting long-term care for clients in their home environment to promote their independence and self-reliance. In the long term, we also support professional and methodological assistance to social workers from the Jewish communities. We supported the social advisory services in the case of Ghetto Pension, the possibility of receiving a pension from the German social system for work in the ghetto in the times of WWII; with respect to this fact, we organized a professional seminar for social workers from the Jewish communities.

In 2009, we supported 19 projects to a total sum of CZK 6 million.

Further On the Long-Term Supported Projects

TIKVAH Home Care Agency of Ostrava Jewish Community

Motto: *"Together we care for life"*

The FHV has been supporting the TIKVAH Agency since 2004, when the Agency was established thanks to the support received from the German foundation Erinnerung, Verantwortung und Zukunft. Among the main activities of the Ostrava Jewish Community, are the special care and social services for people in need. That is the reason why the TIKVAH Home Care Agency was established. The Agency does not only deal with common home care but also with the specific needs of the Holocaust survivors. The priority of Tikvah is to enable the survivors to remain at home for as long as possible and to be safe with respect to their common way of life and integration into the local and religious community. Radka Hrouzkova, the head of the Agency, on her work: "I am in daily touch with senior citizens with exceptional life stories; one could say that each client represents a theme for a novel. The destiny of the Tikvah clients does not constitute formal chapters of history class textbooks. I meet people describing their life stories, people who are forced – against their will – to not only put up with health problems, but also, to a great extent, with psychical problems. In this respect, one always asks oneself whether we do our work well, why do we do our work in this way and not another? Thanks to the help of our citizens, colleagues from Ostrava, the Federation of Jewish Communities in the Czech Republic and the FHV, I could answer more exactly and openly to myself and, at the same time, respect the needs of the clients. We also get positive feedback in the process of fulfilling the formidable criteria of the State Inspection of the Provision of Social Services. The inspection team stated that in the fulfilment of all the fundamental criteria, out of a possible 144 points, we got 120! Their final statement on our services was really complimentary, which made us feel very satisfied indeed. I have to repeat myself – we would not be able to fulfil all the criteria without the help of our senior citizens, colleagues from Ostrava, the Federation of JCs and the FHV."



Liberec Jewish Community

The Liberec Jewish Community began to map over and provide social advisory services in 2006. The Community provides basic and professional social advisory services in the sphere of social security, health care, state social welfare, education, employment and basic legal advisory services in accord with the Social Services Act no. 108/2006 and in accord with the Ministry of Labour and Social Affairs, and assists on the intermediation of other social services. We asked the Secretary and social worker of the Community, Lea Adamova, about the evaluation of the project we support: "Thanks to the FHV support, we are able to continue with the project in the field social care for our senior citizens. Our clients could be ordinary as well as exceptional members of the Liberec Jewish Community, associated organizations to the Liberec JC, direct relatives and partners, as well as other citizens facing an unfavourable life

situation or health problems. We perceive these services as extremely necessary, since they support the independence and self-reliance of our clients. Not only the Holocaust survivors, who we approach with special respect, but every one of us could end up in an unfavourable life situation where that person would prefer to stay in the environment of their own home. Some of the Community clients have had to battle through traumatizing life experiences, the consequence of which is to escape to a loneliness of their own. Therefore, it is important to strengthen their socializing and make them part of the daily life of the Jewish Community. Clients get a monthly bulletin informing them on the life of the Community, on the events that occurred, and also information on the upcoming events to which the clients are always invited. The members like the Senior Café, enabling the elderly to informally meet and chat. The younger

members are attracted by the Jewish dancing classes, which are interesting and full of temperament. Our Community boasts a rich cultural life; we organize exhibitions, lectures and educational events. The social work within the Community requires a very sensitive approach to its members, good communication and empathy. Our social workers need to have a basic legal knowledge as well as good communicative skills. The work is hard, both from the point of view of organization and time, though the satisfaction of the members brings great satisfaction that can balance out all that hard work performed."

Remembrance Programme

We support those projects serving to remember the Jewish and Roma Holocaust victims in a dignified way, through the support of educational projects focusing on the Holocaust. The projects are carried out in schools and in the public. We finance publications, memorial plaques and memorials, social events, documents and exhibitions, meetings with students, workshops, research work, etc.

In 2009, we supported 17 projects to a total amount of CZK 459,000.

Further On the Long-Term Supported Projects

Travelling Exhibition – The Places of Suffering, Death and Heroism, the Auschwitz Historical Group

Since 2005, we have been supporting, on a yearly basis, the travelling exhibition called 'The Places of Suffering, Death and Heroism', which has already been taken to more than 30 cities throughout the country. The exhibition has been visited by thousands of visitors from the general public, especially pupils and students. The exhibition is supported by the talks with eyewitnesses talking about their life, family, friends and experiences from the concentration camps and the times of WWII.



A teacher from the Kardasova Recice basic school at the exhibition: "I visited the exhibition called The Places of Suffering which was a touching experience. I have to admit that seeing some of the panels made me cry. In those moments, I remembered the books of Arnost Lustig and his strong belief that the suffering that people went through during WWII shall not be forgotten, it is something that has to be reminded and explained to the new generations. A. Lustig claims that it would last at least a thousand years till it will be forgiven, though forgotten it will never be.

Being a schoolteacher, I assumed it would be suitable to get my pupils acquainted with the exhibition. The pupils showed a true interest in the exhibition. The exhibition was followed by a talk with Mr. Auerbach. The students actively

participated in the talk. Mr. Auerbach was very helpful and answered all questions.

I assume the exhibition complemented the knowledge of our pupils, and surely had a great effect on the teenagers finding the right direction in their life.

It is important to talk to young people, to have discussions, and to explain the topics also with photos, etc.

Pupils of the 9th grade at our school have to write end of school essays where WWII, the Holocaust, and the personality of Nicholas Winton have become the topic of these essays. In my opinion, it is right that the pupils devote their attention to the topics and do not find the topics a forgotten past, and the pupils are not indifferent to them. I would therefore welcome such exhibitions and discussions in the future."

Renovation Programme

We support the reconstruction, renovation and preservation of Jewish monuments damaged by long-term neglect, amateur renovation practices and construction alterations or vandalism. The goal of our support is to return the monument to its original state, capturing the maximum of the architectural and artistic features, whilst at the same time accepting the possibilities of its new use.

Our activities include the regular maintenance and protection of the monuments to an extent necessary to avert all effects that could cause a worsening of the condition of the monuments. In the Czech Republic, there is no other programme of monument care that supports maintenance, so providing the most appropriate and optimal method for the preservation of authentic values of every cultural monument. Jewish monuments are divided into movable and immovable properties of historical, artistic, scientific or technical value, reflecting religious practices, historical development, creative capacities and life of the Jewish community. Listing the monuments into the Central Register of State Protected Monuments is not required in this respect.

For 2009, the FHV awarded grants to 16 projects, to a total sum amounting to CZK 7,5 million.

Renovation Programme

In 2009, in association with the Brno JC, we implemented a project of revitalization of the Mikulov Jewish Cemetery for which we managed to acquire GBP 10,000 from The Rothschild Foundation Europe. Thanks to the endowment benefit, we were able to make a memorial plaque remembering the activity of the famous Rabbi Löw (Maharal) in Mikulov. We also supported the enlargement of the current exhibition in the ceremonial hall of the cemetery. The project complemented the spectrum of activities taking place in the Czech Republic on the occasion of the 400th anniversary of Maharal's death.

Further On the Long-Term Supported Projects

Since 2001, we have been financing a Long-term project of gradual reconstruction, renovation and preservation of movable and immovable Jewish monuments (owned by the Federation of Jewish Communities) in the territory of the Czech Republic.

The coordinator of the project, Mr. Mojmir Maly, the manager of the Administration of Buildings and Immovable Properties Matana, a.s. explains the establishment of the project: "Firstly, the plan concerned abandoned, devastated and fully neglected cemeteries owned by the smaller Jewish communities that after 1989, as opposed to the Prague JC, did not acquire financial support strong enough to be able to look after the historical heritage in a respectful way. In the course of time, we managed to work on several buildings as well as the properties owned by foreign subjects. Following the finding that in certain regions of the Czech Republic there was not enough attention paid to the restitution of burial grounds to the competence of relevant Jewish communities, the Federation of JCs took over the responsibility for the acquired monuments and incorporated them into the project."



Currently, the project cares for about 92 cemeteries, 10 synagogues, 2 municipal houses, a former Jewish school and several cemetery buildings. The renovation of monuments fell into the competence of the Administration of Buildings and Immovable Properties – Matana – whose employees have a long-time experience and knowledge both in the sphere of state monument care as well as an awareness of adherence to the religious rules. Thanks to their intensive effort, the project received a number of financial contributions and grants from public sources, mainly from the programmes concerning the state monument care. Thanks to the financing of the renovation of synagogues and municipal houses in Ustek and Polna, the synagogue in Krnov and the Jewish School in Jicin, the project will receive a significant financial support from EU funds in the years 2010–2013.

“We do not perceive the project as a one-off assignment that begins and ends several years later. Every year a considerable amount of money has to be spent on the maintenance of the renovated objects, where the progress of renovation is slowing down, also due to inflation. It has to be stressed that the termination or significant restrictions on the financing of the project would result in irreplaceable losses and consequent depreciation of the financial means spent on these projects, not even mentioning the undermining of the efforts of all interested parties who would have been working on these projects for several years by that time.”, Mojmir Maly said.

The FHV is fully aware of this fact and strives to search for other sources of financing.

Future Programme

We support projects aiming to preserve Jewish traditions, educating in Judaism and contributing to the development of Jewish communities. The activities we support are: educational and lecturing projects, workshops and seminars, festivals of Jewish culture, thematic monthly magazines and bulletins, programmes in Jewish nurseries and schools, and other cultural programmes focusing on traditions, history and the current life of the Jewish community.

We do not turn our backs on the rising manifestations of neo-Nazism, so therefore, in 2009; we allocated CZK 500,000 to supporting projects focusing on the prevention of anti-Semitism and vandalism.

In 2009, we supported 23 projects to a total amount of CZK 1,041,000.

Further On the Long-Term Supported Project

Sunday Workshops of Education and Culture Centre of the Prague Jewish Museum

We have been supporting an educational course of Sunday Programmes for pre-school and school children and their parents. The children get acquainted with Jewish Culture, history, traditions and customs in a playful way. Their guide is a lion cub called Arje – the mascot of the workshop. During the course of every workshop, the children listen to an interesting story, learn to sing a song or dance, and take their own hand-made artifacts home. Part of the Sunday workshop is an excursion to the Buildings of the Jewish Museum in Prague.

Below, you may read the comments of some participants of the workshop:

■ All my family loves this Sunday workshop. Especially, the children are always very excited. We get to know a lot of facts in an entertaining way. We appreciate different methods of work with children, thanks to which the children can learn better and remember the new information easily.

We also appreciate the approach of various subjects of the Jewish Museum. We would prefer to learn more about the stories from the Old Testament and learn about the history of Israel or the Jewish settlement of Czech Lands.

■ Me and my son (aged 7) have already visited the Sunday workshop for the third time. My son enjoys visiting the workshop and I sense this activity as very contributive. He gets to know the Jewish Culture and history of the town where we live. The workshops are very well led and perfectly structured (information – activity – visit of the monuments) Thank you!

■ Me and my daughter like the workshops for children very much. The structure of the workshop is great, the classes are well balanced, both the story-telling part and the teaching part, as well as the creative one, except for these Bara is always happy for the snack break. Merger with The Foundation the Czech Council for Nazi Victims (CCNV)

On 18 August 2009, the boards of the directors of the FHV and CCNV signed a Project of Merger of the foundations in accordance with paragraph 8 article 5 of the Act on the Foundations no. 227/1997 Col., and on the change and completion of the associated acts in a full wording, and that as of 1 September, 2009, the Prague City Court of Justice recorded the merger into the Foundations Register, the ruling coming into force as of 31 March, 2010.

The CCNV, representing the interests of Nazi Victims, processed and implemented the project in favour of the people, in order to compensate their forced labour, to fight neo-Nazism, racism, xenophobia, national hatred and the diminishing good name and memory of the Czech Nazi Victims both in the Czech Republic and abroad. The compensation project was successfully finalized and the property of the CCNV did not cover the costs necessary for the fulfilment of tasks for which the foundation was established. Since the mission of the FHV is of a similar type, the boards of the directors came to an agreement to merge the foundations.

The FHV took over the rest of the property of the CCNV, its commitments and rights, specifically the supervision of over 38 projects that were or are still being implemented with CCNV support.

Financial Report

As of the record date, 1 September 2009, the FHV merged with CCNV. As of 31 August 2009, a financial statement for both foundations was completed. Thereby, the 2009 accounting period of the FHV does not correspond to the calendar year, but to the period from 1 January 2009 to 31 August 2009. Due to the quantification of yearly administration costs, the FHV also compiled an interlocutory FHV financial statement to 31 December 2009, i.e. for a period of 4 months.

The State Property Fund (hereinafter as SPF) endowment benefit of year 2000 amounted to CZK 300,000 thousand. The financial means have continuously been invested since December 2005 in a Balanced Fund of Foundations (hereinafter as BFF) at Pioneer Investments, a.s. and in CSOB Asset Management, a.s.

Granted endowment benefits in 2009 amounted to CZK 15,000 thousand, and 30 % of administration costs in accord with Addendum no. 3 to the agreement with SPF amounts to CZK 4,500 thousand. In order to state the total costs of the FHV for 2009, regular and interlocutory profit and loss statements have to be added up. In 2009, the total costs of the FHV amounted to CZK 3,067 thousand, which is 20.45 % of endowed foundation benefits, i.e. that the FHV fulfilled the criteria stated in the agreement with SPF. To get the actual costs of the administration of the FHV, amounting to 2,559 thousand, i.e. 17.06 % of the endowed foundation benefits, we have to deduct the costs associated with holding the financial investments from the total costs.

From the Auditor's Letter

On 18 August 2009, a project of a merger was prepared; the subjects concerned are the Czech Council for Nazi Victims Foundation (ceasing to exist) and the Foundation for Holocaust Victims. The merger was approved by the Prague City Court of Justice ruling on 24 March 2010, coming into force as of 31 March 2010.

Due to the fact that the project of the merger was approved only in the following year, coming into effect as of 1 September 2009, the regular statement of accounts and audit of the financial statement were performed for the period from 1 January 2009 to 31 August 2009. Further regular statement of accounts will be performed for the period from 1 September 2009 to 31 December 2010.

For the period from 1 January 2009 to 31 December 2009, we considered the state of the foundation administration costs on the basis of the review of yearly figures. The indicator of total costs for the administration of the foundation constitutes 20.45 % of the granted endowment benefits. Excluding the costs of a so called "holding of financial investment", the indicator is 17.06 %. The FHV, therefore, fulfilled the indicators of the level of foundation administration costs for the period of 1 January 2009 to 31 December 2009 (the limit for 2009 was set to a max. 30 % of the granted endowment benefits).

He is the author of many publications and gives lectures all over the world. Lately, he has mostly been giving lectures on Czech-German relations during WWII, and on the life in the concentration camps, to German schools and Christian-Jewish Societies in Germany. He holds several state awards and is an honourable member of several scientific societies in the Czech Republic and abroad.
